# Happy New Year!

I hope everyone has had a lovely holiday. It has certainly been beautiful around here this week. We are starting the year off-let's call it interesting!

This past Saturday afternoon, our neighbor, Dr. John Prahinski, let me know that the situation at the hospital has, once again, become overwhelming. He advised that we consider going back to virtual worship for a few weeks. Our Congregational Council voted, via email, to go to virtual worship through the month of January and reassess the situation towards the end of the month. What that means for us is the following:

- —We will need to pre-record worship during the week before each Sunday-we need worship leaders and anyone who might be willing to offer music to let us know so that we can schedule those recording times;

## <u>The Season of Epiphany</u>

As with many elements of the official church year, I did not grow up hearing about Epiphany. The story of the star and the wise men was included in the Christmas pageant (in which I longed to be a shepherd or a wise man, but had to settle for Mary or an angel) and when Christmas was over, it was over. Nothing remained until next December. When I discovered Epiphany, it became a favorite of mine-as a religious holiday, it centers the new year beautifully, offering a moment for each of us to consider what light has been brought into our lives, what light we might share with others.

# **Care Groups**

What is a Care Group? A group of 8-10 people who have a shared interest (of any sort) who agree to connect with each other once/month through the year.

## How do I join a Care Group?

- Gather some friends and let Martha know who has joined you in the Care Group;
- Join our Care Group Zoom on January 16th and meet up with other people in break-out rooms to get things started!

### Why should I join a Care Group?

- One of the most frequently stated priorities of the church that came out of our summer conversations was a desire to get to know each other better—Care Groups hope to serve that need;
- Our Deacon program has offered care over the last two years, but our deacons struggle to get responses from their groups and we have struggled to get enough people to serve as Deacons.
- Care Groups allow each of us to carry a small piece of looking out for each other without anyone having to be overburdened.

### What will be asked of me in a Care Group?

- Meet (in person when possible) once/month. You can have any kind of gathering you wish-food, games, sports, your shared activity, hot tubbing...whatever the group decides.
- Each member of the Care Group will cover one task:
  - Communicating needs to the church
  - Bringing food
  - Organizing the group
  - Leading the activity
  - Writing notes or emails to those who cannot attend
  - Connecting with homebound members (each Care Group will get one or two homebound members to connect with)

The tasks can be permanently assigned or float around the group, but Bonnie Benedict, the Chair of the Care Group team, will need to know who is doing the communication each month.

Join us on **January 16th at 5pm** for our initial meeting on Zoom. Once we've met, your group can set up your meeting times however you would like.
